Interview is asking 12 year old Will Power a question: What do you notice as the greatest mental difference between kids and adults?

Will: Adults have more doubts about life, slower in decision making, have difficulty sharing themselves with those they love and spend way to much time watching other people live.

Interviewer: Do you have any advice to better explain what adults should be doing more of?

Will: Think of a pitcher and a catcher in a softball game. Adults seem to get parables based on sports. I find poetry can also bring thought to words of value. (Will states the following poem as the audience views a college pitcher and catcher in softball)

The soul is felt when giving and a life is shared with glee.

I know not why or when, the how will come inside.

I know like you I'm here for now and should pay to simply ride.

The catcher calls the game and orchestrates the dream. Aware of all surroundings and guides the hope of team. I find it most rewarding when the game is won on skill. But win or loose I know the act was guided by free will.

Freedom moves the spirit and love of life to be.

The future pulls the player and guides my heart to see.

If life could only duplicate the feel of action felt.

The kid in me is grown beyond the life that I have dealt.
